

SCHOOL AND ALUMNI NOTES.

The Law School commences the year with the largest matriculation in its history. The enrolment of the entering freshman class is especially noticeable, exceeding last year's number by thirty men. The registration figures on October 12th were as follows: Graduates, 12; 3rd year, 67; 2nd year, 65; 1st year, 101; Specials, 20; total, 265. A large number of students from the Academical Department are also taking advantage of the plan inaugurated last year, whereby they can complete a year's work in law, having the same count on their Art's degree.

The Wm. L. Storrs lectures will be delivered this year by Judge Emory Speer, of the United States Circuit Court.

W. H. Buckler, of Trinity College, Cambridge, has been invited to lecture on "The Relation of Roman Law to other Sciences."

Dean Henry Wade Rogers delivered an address in Faneuil Hall, Boston, Tuesday evening, October 10th, on "The Powers of the President." The address, which was given under the invitation of the Anti-Imperialistic League and under its auspices, is creating much favorable comment from the leading newspapers and periodicals.
