1872. Henry C. Baldwin died of nervous prostration at Waterbury on January 15th. Mr. Baldwin was born in Naugatuck in 1842. He was the Greenback candidate for Governor of Connecticut, and later an active supporter of the Democratic party.

1878. Kazuo Hatoyama has recently been elected Speaker of the House of Commons of the Imperial Parliament of Japan. From 1881 until 1889 Mr. Hatoyama was Professor of International and Roman Law in the University of Tokio, and at varied intervals has been Dean of the University Law School, Director of the Bureau of Law in the Department of Foreign Affairs, and a member of the Higher Civil Service Commission. In 1889 he resigned all these positions, entered active practice and became one of the leaders of the Japanese bar. In 1894 he was elected to the House of Commons from one of the districts of Tokio, and has since been regarded as the leader of his party. Mr. Hatoyama is also a Railroad Commissioner, a member of the Council of State for the Doctorate Degrees, and President of the Tokio College of Law and Politics.

1879. Edward D. Robbins has recently been elected Vice-President of the New England Railroad Co. He was a member of the temporary Board of Directors which purchased the company before it came under the control of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Co., and has been its counsel for several years.

1881. Charles P. Woodbury died of pneumonia at Norwalk on December 30th. Mr. Woodbury was Assistant Clerk of the Connecticut House of Representatives in 1882 and Clerk of the Senate in 1883, and at the time of his death was connected with the Connecticut Building and Loan Association.

1885. Hon. John G. Tod has been chosen Judge of the Civil District Court of Houston, Texas. Since 1892 he has been County Judge of Harris County, Texas.
